PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE by Kathy Thomson

Last month, several Friends' members attended a celebration for volunteers at the RSVP luncheon in Oxnard. Amazingly, over 75,000 hours were logged by the dedicated retired seniors, including many of our own Friends of the Library volunteers.

Recently I read an article which stated that non-profits comprise 11 percent of the United States workforce and will contribute about 6 percent to GDP this year. In fact, the charitable segment surpassed the size of our national defense in 1993 and is still growing. Volunteers for these charitable groups number between four and ten million full time employees, depending on the guide by which this group is measured.

Of course, you already know that volunteers make extremely valuable contributions to the country and philanthropy is a driving force that fills many gaps in society. But are you aware that only 14 percent of contributions comes from foundations and 5 percent from corporations, whereas the remainder comes from individuals? Volunteers and charitable contributors are a mighty powerful force and a great asset to our country and the world.

So, while praising our volunteers, we must also treat them kindly. One way you can help is by being extremely judicious and prudent with any book donations that come our way. The library will unlikely place a book in the collection if it is more than five years old. Books we sell in the bookstore are usually from the years 2011 to present and in bookstore ready condition. Older titles may or may not be able to be used at our periodic sales, so we are asking that you prudently cull for items that could be readily resold. Please, no torn, mildewed, worn or damaged books. Large donations left overflowing at the donation bin make extreme amounts of extra work for our two book store managers.

We are greatly appreciative of your assistance in this area. Compliance will save many volunteer hours each month. If you are so inclined to offer assistance, please procure a bookstore assistant application in our bookstore at Foster Library. Many hands make light work and we can always use a few extra hands!

Makerspaces at the Library

Makerspace Librarian, Antonio Apodaca

With about a decade of public library experience, from page to administrator, Antonio is very excited to embrace the innovative role of Makerspace Librarian with Ventura County and Foster Library! In his former role with the Maricopa County Library District in Phoenix, Arizona, he organized outcome-based programs across 17 branches and coordinated a summer reading program for 62 libraries that had over 77,000 participants in 2015. Wearing many hats, Antonio was also the project lead on developing free and open source digital badging software, the head grant writer, the staff development manager, along with the lead on mobile makerspace kits and creative equipment labs. He recently relocated from Arizona with his lovely wife and two little girls and is honored to call Ventura County his home.

In case you're wondering, the "maker" movement is a new trend for public libraries, but has repeatedly surfaced throughout the years. As long as people have been making stuff, the spirit of makerspaces has been alive. The library is building on that concept, offering a physical place for people of all ages to share ideas and use creative technology, such as our laser 3D printers. Makerspaces are part DIY projects (Do It Yourself), part STEM practice (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) and part community involvement.

Antonio aims to continue the spirit of making—celebrating discovery, ingenuity and learning for the sake of learning. In the Library LAB, he will facilitate the growth and impact of "maker" programs and reinforce connections with neighborhood partners. With the help of the whole team, he looks to embed the spirit of "making" in library services, collaborations and projects.



The "MakerBox" is making the rounds at Ventura County Library branches and other city libraries in the county, bringing elements needed to create something using new technology. Some of the newest technology — from 3D printing to LED circuitry — is now available thanks to a \$20,000 grant from the state, awarded through the Library Services and Technology Act, which is administered in California by the state librarian and supported federally by the Institute of Museum and Library Services.

Saticoy Library has held several MakerBox events on the first Thursday of the month, 3:00 to 5:00 pm. The next event is scheduled for Thursday, May 5.


At E.P. Foster, the **Library LAB** is open on Wednesdays 4:30 to 6:30 pm. Come by the library on Wednesday evenings to learn more about the 3D printer and laser cutter—or to use them yourself! Ask the library staff about what you need to bring to print or engrave an item of your own.

Makeshop is open at E.P. Foster on alternate Tuesdays from 3:00 to 5:00 pm. On Tuesday, April 19, build a "No Wire" Circuit, using different conductive materials, an LED light, a small battery.



VENTURA FREE LIBRARY TRUCK

A NEW DEPARTURE in library service has recently been inaugurated by Miss Elizabeth R. Topping of the Ventura County Free Library. The Board of Supervisors have given to the county library both a sedan and a truck to be used exclusively in library work. The use made of the truck is something new in California library work. Miss Topping had the truck equipped with specially built shelves



for books, with space within the body of the car for carriage of both furniture and books. The truck is used as a traveling branch library. The truck has a schedule of places to stop and persons are issued books from the truck's bookshelves. Ventura County has a number of oil camps. At these places the truck arrives at around 6:30 p. m. and issues books to the men. The mileage covered by this truck branch library is around one thousand miles per month. Miss Topping finds this manner of distributing books to country patrons much better than that of small branch libraries in country communities.


Avenue Library is also adding manipulatives to encourage early literacy skills. In October, thanks to the Eaton trust, new bilingual materials were added to the collection.

Homework Centers provide free homework help for students K-12 at E.P. Foster, Avenue and Saticoy libraries on a first-come, first served basis. Students get help with free printing, computer access and research assistance. A volunteer at Avenue Library reports that one of her students was able to move from Special Education to a mainstream class through the support offered at the library.





English classes are offered free to the public nearly every day that Avenue Library is open. Classes see a range of learners and teachers from all over the world. It is inspiring to see native speakers of Portuguese, Russian and Spanish all come together to learn English at Avenue Library. New student workers who speak Spanish have increased the outreach to Spanish speakers.



Participants submit their own original haiku at any library location or online at tiny.cc/vclhaiku. Entries will be judged by Ventura County Poet Laureate Phil Taggart, and the winners will receive custom-designed prizes commemorating their accomplishments.

All submissions should follow the traditional format for haiku: three lines of five, seven, and five syllables each. The contest is open to all ages and topics; contact the library for further information regarding contest rules.

The earliest visitors to California's valleys and foothills found a sea of wildflowers where grasses were scarce and vast elk herds grazed. Why then do so many call these areas "grasslands" when even today native wildflowers can so completely cover them that hardly a grass blade is seen? Answering that takes looking back at some plant ecology history still hugely affecting California native plant conservation. California's prairies are its lost ecosystem hiding in plain sight. Dr. Holstein will explore their misunderstood history, their unique ecology, their great biodiversity, and their urgent conservation challenges.

The link appears in the lower left hand corner of the home page. It takes you to a form you can use to suggest an item that you think would be a good addition to the Ventura County Library.


In addition to suggesting an item to purchase, you may also:

Check the catalog to see if another Ventura County Library branch has the item you want.

Visit the eLibrary to see if a digital version of your item is available.

Search in WorldShare if you'd like to get your item through Interlibrary Loan.

At E.P. Foster Library, customers looking for titles the library does not own can submit a request for the Foster branch to purchase the title in eBook format through Amazon. For titles that meet the library's criteria, the customer can then borrow a Kindle DX eReader from the library with the title pre-loaded and ready to read. In most situations, it will be possible to have the device ready to lend on the same day!
