Avenue Library, the focus of our first 50th anniversary celebration, has been part of the Ventura County Library system well before San Buenaventura Friends of the Library was created.

The Avenue Library opened in January 1948 as the "West End Branch" occupying half of a garage located on River Street. Although only open for six hours a week the library became a favorite meeting place, especially for children. After several moves, in the mid 1990's, budget cuts nearly caused its closure. A huge outpouring of community support and a federal Community Development Block Grant came to the rescue and the library opened at its present location in the historic Casa de Anza building.





The library continues to meet their goals of promoting reading and literacy to the children of the community, with a bilingual early literacy class Mondays at 5:30 pm, a Homework Center Monday through Thursday, 3:30-5:30 pm with a bilingual tutor on site and computers and resources are available at no cost! English as a Second Language classes continue to be popular at the Avenue Library. Four days a week, introductory English classes are offered through Laubach Literacy by appointment, call (805) 385-9584. Pumarosa Drop-in ESL classes are offered on Wednesdays at 9 am and 5 pm and on Saturdays at 5 pm, providing language instruction and help with internet, forms, and more.

The need for computer literacy education is real in the community, and Avenue Library is ready to meet that need with "By Appointment" computer classes (805) 643-6393. There are also plans to reboot the 4 week Computer Bootcamp series in the coming months.
